RE: MAT Proposals

At their August meeting, the Board of Regents approved seven M.A.T. degrees for teacher education programs in the College of Education (Early Childhood Education, Mathematics Education, Science Education, Foreign Language Education, Middle School Education, Social Studies Education, and Special Education). These M.A.T. degrees were initiated in response to the Board of Regents' request that all USG institutions revise their programs to meet the new definitions of the M.A.T. and M.Ed. degrees with the M.A.T. as the degree that prepares teachers with initial certification and the M.Ed. reserved for already certified teachers (see attached memo sent to the Graduate School to explain the change from the M.E.D. designation to the M.A. T. for our initial certification programs).

At the time the other seven degrees were approved, the English Education program was not included in that group, while we waited for an existing MAT in English offered through the College of Arts and Sciences to be terminated. Since that termination has been approved, the Department of Language and Literacy Education is requesting that its current M.E.D. with initial certification in English be designated as an M.A. T. to be consistent with the other initial certification programs in the college as well as the Board of Regents' definitions.

ENGLISH EDUCATION

The M.Ed. Initial Certification (M.Ed.I.C.) enables individuals who have an undergraduate degree in English or the equivalent course content in the discipline to secure **initial** teacher certification.

Plus Certification in Secondary English Education</p> <p>Program and Course Requirements</p> <p>The M.Ed. plus certification program consists of a minimum of 33 credit hours of graduate course work, SPED 2000, and 12 hours of student teaching. Students' courses taken in the program must conform to the following configuration.</p> <p>Group I, II, & III courses are required for initial certification. Group I and Group II courses should be taken before beginning Group III courses. Currently, SPED 2000 is only offered as an undergraduate course. The other two may be taken at either level but if taken at the graduate level, those courses will count both for certification and toward the MED degree.</p> <p>Group I (required for certification; 3 courses total, 9 hours)</p> <p>EPSY 2020 <i>Learning & Development in</i></p>	<p style="text-align: center;">M.Ed. in Secondary English Education</p> <p>Program and Course Requirements</p> <p>The M.Ed. program consists of a minimum of 36 credit hours of graduate course work, which is typically accomplished by taking 12 courses. Students' programs of study will be designed to meet individual needs and interests. However, courses taken in the program must conform to the following configuration indicating minimal credit hours in each of six areas:</p> <p>Foundations (1 course)</p> <p>Language Education, Educational Psychology, History, Psychology, African American Studies, Women's Studies, Anthropology, Sociology, Philosophy</p> <p>Curriculum & Teaching (4 courses)</p> <p>ELAN courses taught by <u>English Education faculty</u>, with the exception of ELAN 7400 and ELAN 7408, which are open ONLY to students who are seeking a teaching certificate as part of their master's degree, so students who are already certified should not</p>
